Rector Reflection

It's hard to believe 2025 is nearly over. In some ways, it feels like we just met and yet, here we are at the end of the year. As we prepare to host and feast at the end of November, and as Christmas trees are lit and decorated, as day grow shorter and nights are punctuated with twinkling lights, I find myself feeling an immense sense of gratitude and wonder. I love the holiday season; I love Advent hymns in worship, lighting the wreath, and preparing for the birth of Jesus. I love the decorations that will light our neighborhood, and I can't wait to walk candy cane lane with all of you. As we

move into this season of festivities and light, I am also reminded of the deep anxieties I have heard from many of you over the past several months.

It has seemed at times that peace is far off, with violent headlines and continual political upheaval. There have been times when our conversations have been marked by desolation and wondering whether God will intervene in a way we can recognize. Some of you have lost loved ones this year; I, too, have lost people I love in 2025. Amid the joys of our new relationship and moments of wonder and hope, there have also been times of sorrow and grief. This, my friends, is another reason I love this time of year—the darkness of the natural world and the expectant waiting of Advent makes space for this jumble of emotions and experiences. We sing with joy alongside Mary, even while we hope for salvation with Isaiah. We light the candles of hope, peace, joy, and love, even as we notice the world longing for those gifts. Advent is a time to experience the joy and wonder of the incarnation, and it is also a time to tell the truth about the hard spaces of shadow in our lives and our world. Like those beautiful lights twinkling in the winter night, Jesus comes to us with hope and salvation, offering a glimmer of hope in a world that may, at times, feel dark.

This year, it is my hope that we may each experience gratitude and wonder, and that church may be a place which makes room for our grief and our joy.

FROM YOUR DEACON ...

Do you remember the Parable of the Rich Fool? It's the one where the already-wealthy farmer had such a bumper crop that he could not store it all. So, in deciding what to do, he only thought of himself. He did not think of his neighbors who did not have enough to eat. He gave no gratitude to God for the receipt of his unexpected windfall. Being overtaken by greed, he could only think of building bigger barns. Then he said to his soul, "Soul, you have ample goods laid up for many years; relax, eat, drink, and be merry." God told him that he was being a fool

for not being rich toward God, for not being rich in what matters to God, forgetting about God's true riches.

It was the prevailing thought in first century Palestine that the only way to wealth and elite economic status was by exploiting the masses. (Think of the tax collectors who were agents for Rome and took as much for themselves as they could.) For a rich landowner, the only way he could possibly have amassed such a great amount of land was by foreclosing on the lands of his neighbors when they were in economic difficulties.

We know today that there are ways to earn a living, to be financially fortunate, without exploiting the poor. It does matter to God how we obtain our treasure and that we realize the true source of these riches with gratitude. And then it also matters to God how we use our treasure along with our time and talent. I don't think in the Parable of the Rich Fool that Jesus is advising us not to save for our future or to entirely avoid relaxing to eat, drink, and be merry every now and then. He wants us to be good stewards of the resources entrusted to us, focused on God's true riches. We should have an appropriate balance between our concern for the economic uncertainties of the future and the mandate to show compassion and bring about God's kingdom on earth. We show that compassion by caring for our neighbor, providing for the poor and marginalized, for those without access to the world's wealth or even to the basic needs of survival.

Mahatma Ghandi said that the "earth provides enough to satisfy everyone's need, but not enough for everyone's greed." So, let's be rich in what matters to God. Let's use our time, talent, and treasure with compassion. Let us be rich toward God.

They sang "All Things Bright and Beautiful" as they processed down the aisle behind the cross, the Bible, and Delaney, before joining the congregation. Children of all ages participated as they were able, as greeters, ushers, readers, and even helped Delaney in the breaking of the bread. Celeste told the story of St. Francis, in place of the homily, in the same way the story is told in the Godly Play class. An amazing thing happened. The week before, in the community garden, a wild bird came down and Celeste showed a photo of the bird on her hand--just like St. Francis! There was even a surprise visit by our own St. Francis. The class painted large animals on paper that were attached to the front of the altar and on the lectern and pulpit. At the end of the service, the children gave everyone in the congregation a special, painted animal rock as a remembrance of the special day.


