


ECM Birthday Party Re-Cap

Have you had a chance to see our updated website? If not, check it out now! www.saintmarks-stl.org It has been especially designed to be easier to read on your phone or mobile device.

Heaven & Hell

A while ago I was asked if Episcopalians believe in Heaven. Donning my Anglican-via-media hat, I responded that different folks hold different beliefs about “heaven.” I also added that as no one has ever come back to tell us definitively, then we can carry on with what believe, *and* (notice the “both/and” here) we can look to our Catechism in the Book of Common Prayer for its guidance.

On page 862 of the BCP we find: *Q. What do we mean by heaven and hell? A. By heaven we mean eternal life in our enjoyment of God; by hell we mean eternal death in our rejection of God.*

Good Anglican that I am, I am able to say that I find much merit in the response about heaven. But about hell? Well, not so much. Knowing God’s boundless love in my own life as well as the lives of others, I find it hard to wrap my head (let alone my heart) around “eternal death” from God.

After this conversation, I came across an interview with Karen Armstrong in the New York Times Book Review [<https://nyti.ms/3erWD4R>]. Karen Armstrong is a former Roman Catholic nun who has written extensively on comparative religion. Perhaps her most famous book is *A History of God* (1993), followed by *The Battle for God* (2000). I was blessed to be with her for a two-day seminar in seminary several years ago.

In the interview, Armstrong talks about her life-long engagement with religion:

My understanding of religion was transformed nearly 30 years ago by the great Muslim scholar and mystic Ibn al-Arabi (1165-1240). Sadly, he is little known in the West. A truly religious person... equally at home in a synagogue, temple, church or mosque, since no faith has the monopoly of truth:

“Do not praise your own faith so exclusively that you disbelieve all the rest. If you do this, you will fail to recognize the real truth of the matter. God, the omnipresent and omnipotent, cannot be confined to any one creed, for he says, ‘Wheresoever ye turn, there is the face of Allah.’ (Quran 2:115). Everybody praises what he believes; his god is his own creature and in praising it he praises himself. Consequently, he blames the beliefs of others, which he would not do if he were just, but his dislike is based on ignorance.”

Do not praise your own faith so exclusively that you disbelieve all the rest.

I suppose it was the conversation about heaven, but when I read this quote from al-Arabi I immediately thought of the time-worn joke about a new soul being shown around heaven by St. Peter. They are standing in front of a huge wall and the new soul asks, “What’s that wall all about?” And St. Peter responds, “Shh... that’s the Roman Catholics—they think they’re the only ones here.”

Of course, you can slot in any other faith or denomination that holds any belief in heaven. I first heard it from a Roman Catholic friend of my father’s way back when I was in grade school. Looking back, I suppose the adult laughter I heard was meant to be ironic. As clichéd and hackneyed and time-worn as it is, sadly I think that joke (and others like it) speak to a deeper challenge in our human nature: the need to separate, to create “the other,” to build up oneself by knocking others down.

While this tendency is something that we, as followers of Jesus on the Way of Love, are called to resist as we endeavor to be Christ’s hands and heart and voice in the world, striving for active peace, I find it especially glaring during these days in the run-up to the mid-term elections.

The “othering” that takes place, the vitriol and negativity that has become part and parcel of our political and social discourse, leads me to wonder, quoting Dorothy Parker: “What fresh hell is this?” And maybe that’s the answer to the question about hell in the Book of Common Prayer.

Of course, we don’t need to participate in the bitterness and scorn we find across most media. We do have the power to turn it off (or not turn it on in the first place). As followers of Christ, we also have the power of prayer: to pray for those at the margins, to pray for the opening of hearts among those who oppress and denigrate, to pray that God’s limitless love would be embraced by all.

Pray. And then vote.

From your Deacon...

During the first half of November, we have two “civic” events coming up – our mid-term elections on November 8 and Veterans’ Day which we celebrate on November 11. But when it comes down to it, I cannot separate my “civic” self from myself as a follower of Jesus. The Interfaith Partnership of Greater St. Louis gets this connection when it states: “We revere democracy because it is through democracy that we show that every voice and every person matters. Democracy embodies our commitment to peace, giving us structures to resolve social conflict without violence. Democracy is the way we engage in dialogue with each other, resolving differences peaceably. And democracy shows our concern for the community, ensuring that the few cannot rule over the many. Democracy is of moral and religious importance.”

Our US framework for democracy as amended with equal protections of minorities allows us as a society to pursue the kingdom of God here and now. That is something to keep in mind as we go to the polls. And for the preservation of our democracy for the last 240+ years, we owe a debt of gratitude to our veterans, the women and men who have given their time and labors – and in too many cases their lives – under arduous conditions.

In order to honor and thank all our veterans, I am officiating a service at Emmanuel in Webster Groves at 11:00 AM on Friday, November 11. I invite the congregation of St. Mark’s to attend, along with any others you would like to bring. The service will be a short time for us to come together as a community and lift up our prayers and thanksgivings for those who have served us.

Musical Notes from Barbara

The month of December brings us a wealth of beautiful music for both the Advent and Christmas seasons. One of the best-loved Advent hymns is “O Come, O Come, Emmanuel,” which we will sing on the fourth Sunday of Advent, and which will also be the basis of some of our Advent choral and organ music. This hymn had its origins in the medieval “O Antiphons,” a series of seven antiphons intended to be sung at vespers services during the week before Christmas. Each antiphon begins with “O” (hence the name “O Antiphons”) followed by a title of Christ taken from the Hebrew Scriptures (“Wisdom, Key of David, Branch of Jesse,” etc.) and concludes with a request for Christ to come (“Come and teach us the way of Wisdom,” etc.) The Latin words were translated into English in the 19th century and later paired with a 15th-century French melody to create the hymn we know today.



I’d like to invite anyone who enjoys singing but isn’t able to sing with the choir on a regular basis to join us for the Christmas season. We rehearse on Thursday evenings from 7:30-9:00 p.m. and will sing for the 10:30 p.m. service on Christmas Eve. If you’d like to sing with us, please be in touch with me (braedeke@aol.com). 
