Well, friends, here we are in the middle of the dog days of summer. Air conditioners have been blowing, popsicles melting in small, sticky hands, and sweat wiped from brows on a continual basis. Summer in St. Louis reminds me of winter in Milwaukee—

certainly not in terms of the temperature, but rather the weather tends to dictate how we spend our days. In Milwaukee, when the lake would dump a foot of snow we knew it was a day for hot cocoa and the snow blower. Here in St. Louis in July and August, when the heat index tops 100 we know it's a day for popsicles, ice water, and slow movement. In some ways, these extremes (when we have what we need to survive) are almost like a Sabbath reminder from God. When it gets too hot to live our busy schedules, it's almost like our creator pressing a pause button, and reminding us to slow down.

On the final day of creation, so the story goes, God rested. After all the work that God had done, separating the waters, causing dry land to appear, creating plants, animals, and all that is, God was tired. So, God rested. This act of sabbath-taking from whence "Sabbatical" comes, is a gift from God just like all the other parts of creation. God's pause reminds us that part of being made in God's image is taking a break and resting. In the midst of a busy life and a hot season here in St. Louis, I hope you find some time to engage the gift of sabbath. After all, if rest is good enough for God, it's good enough for us.


Outreach (Jerre+, Deacon and Marilyn, vestry liaison) to care for our neighbors


